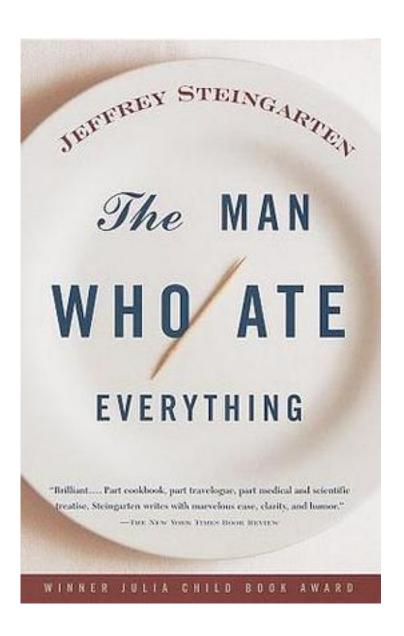
The Man Who Ate Everything (Vintage)
