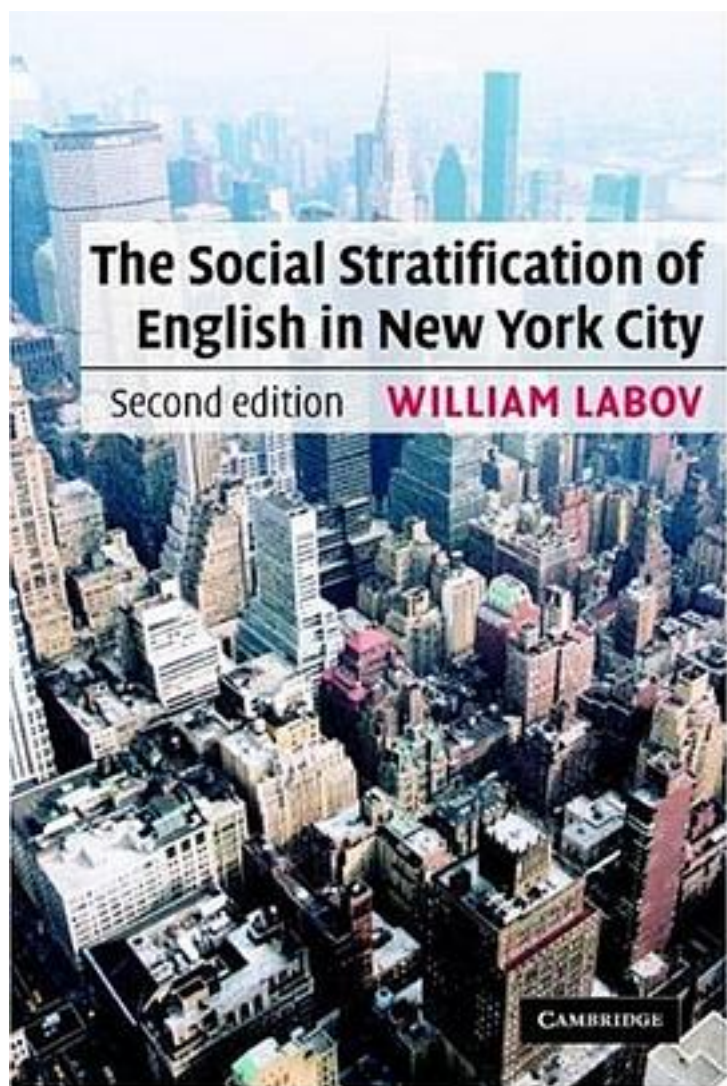


The Social Stratification of English in New York City
