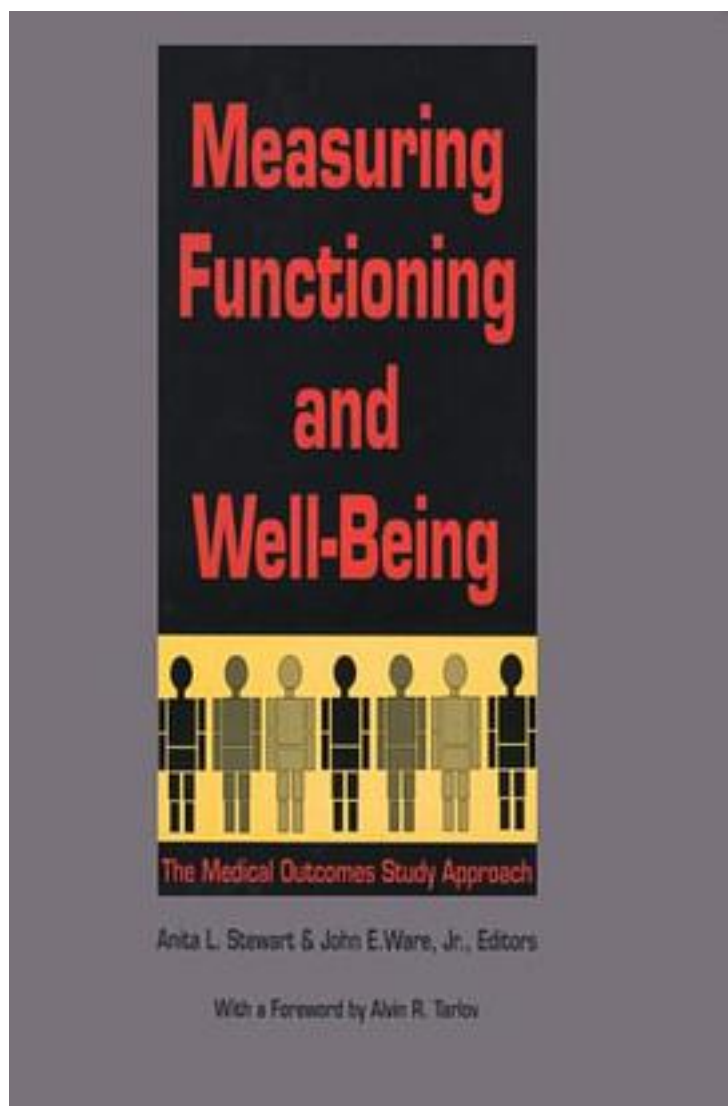


# Measuring Functioning and Well-being
