
Decolonizing Cultures in the Pacific



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In "Decolonizing Cultures in the Pacific", Susan Y. In particular, she examines how contemporary writers from Hawai'i, Samoa, and Aotearoa/New Zealand remember, re-tell, and deploy this violent history in their work.
