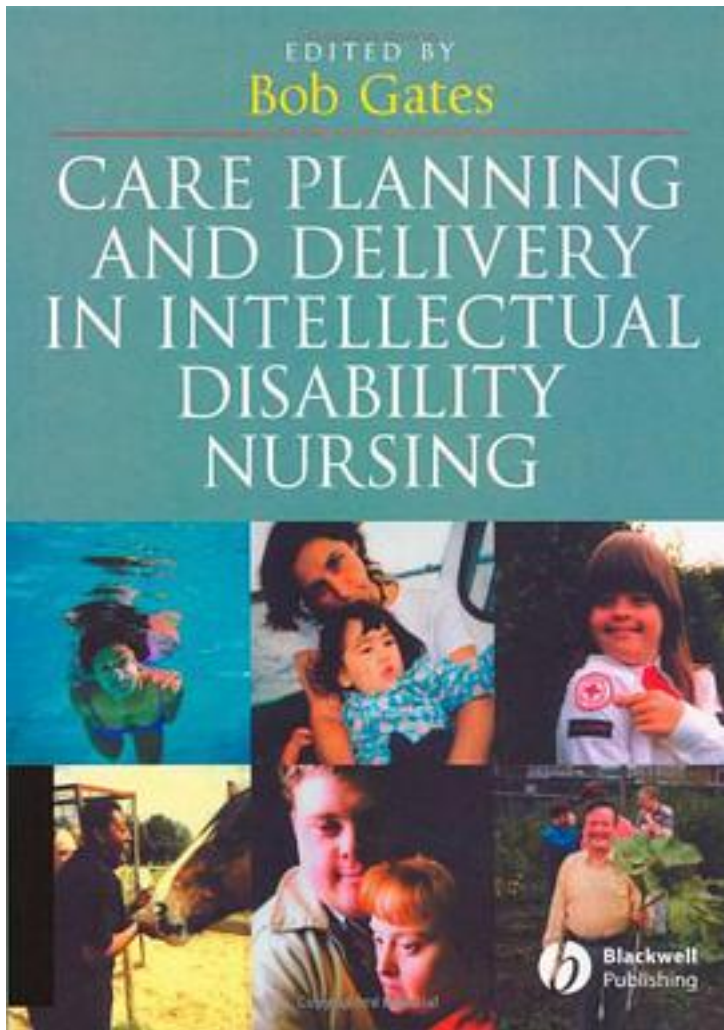


Care Planning and Delivery in Intellectual Disability Nursing
