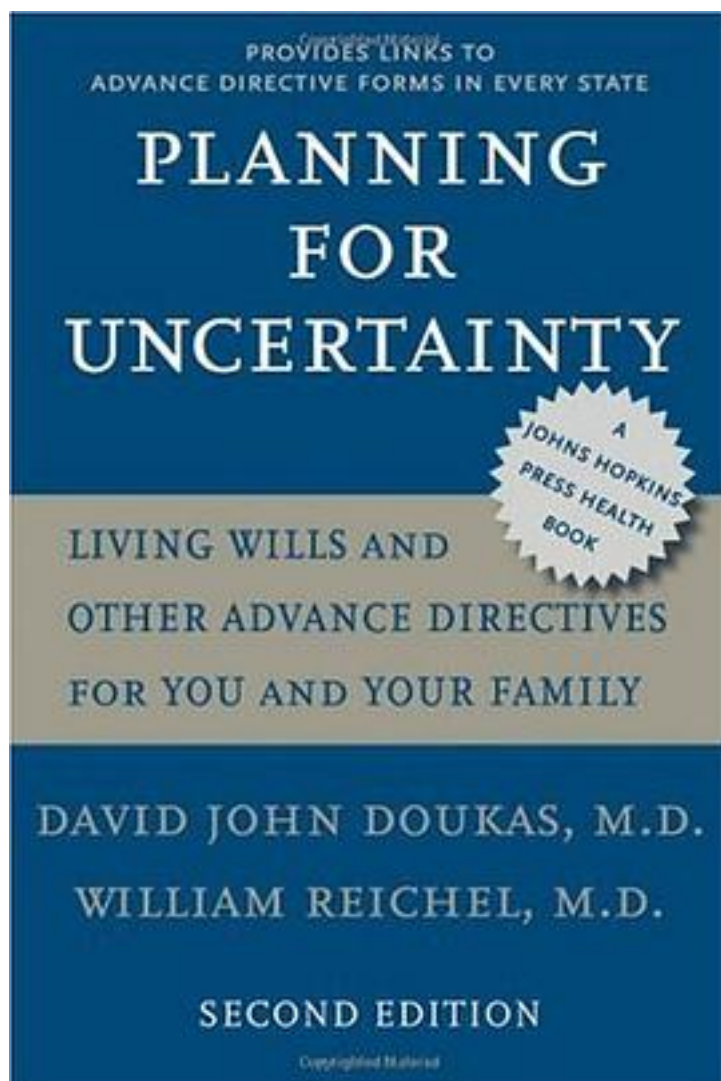


# Planning for Uncertainty
