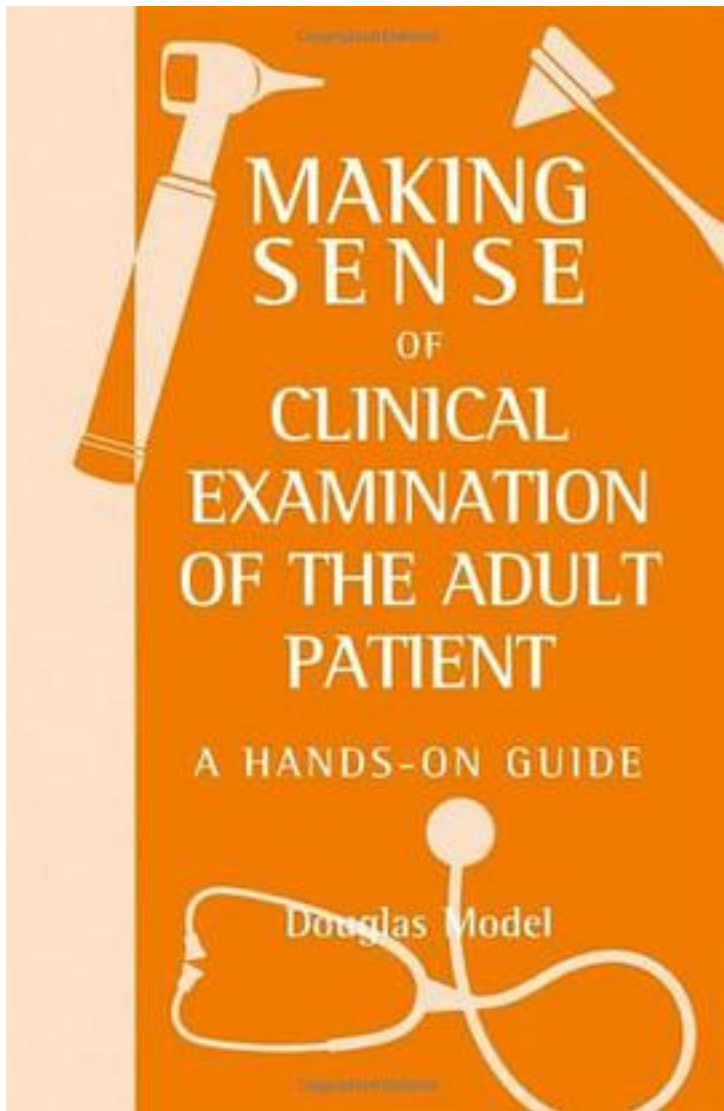


Making Sense of Clinical Examination of the Adult Patient
