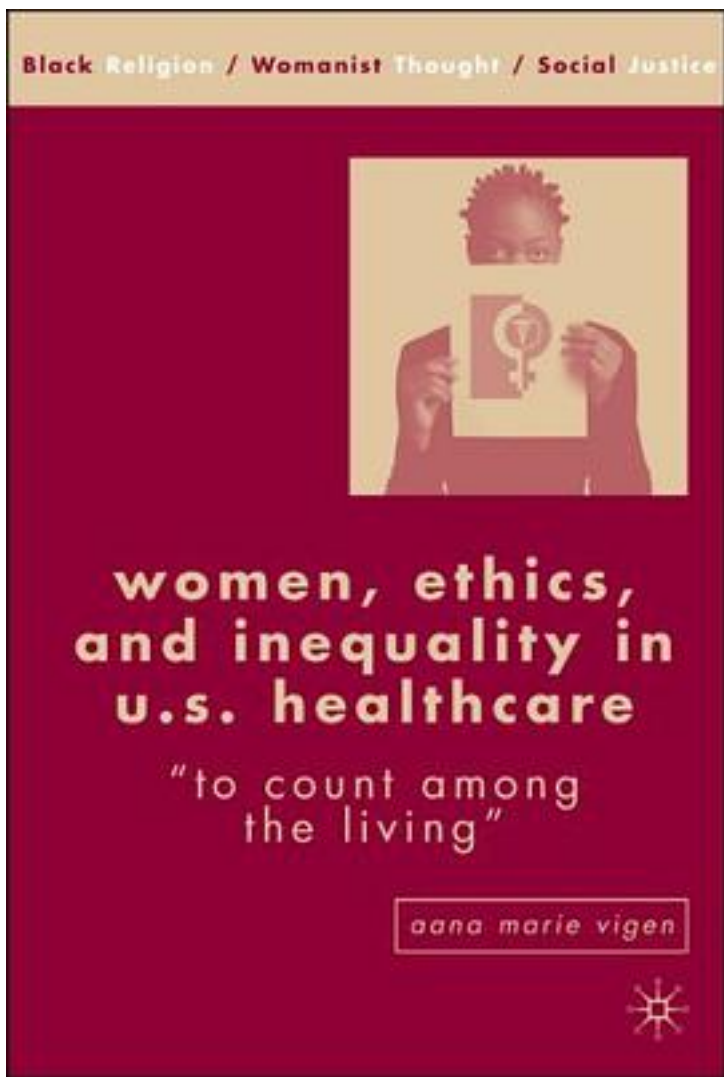


Women, Ethics and Inequality in U.S. Healthcare
