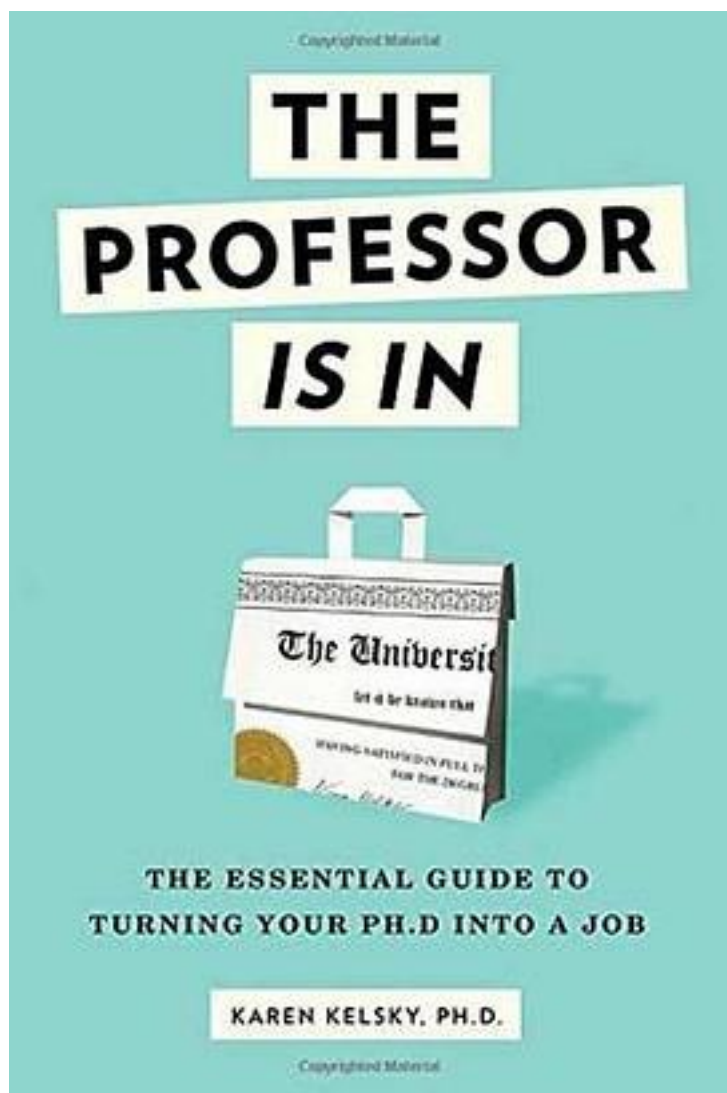


The Professor Is In
