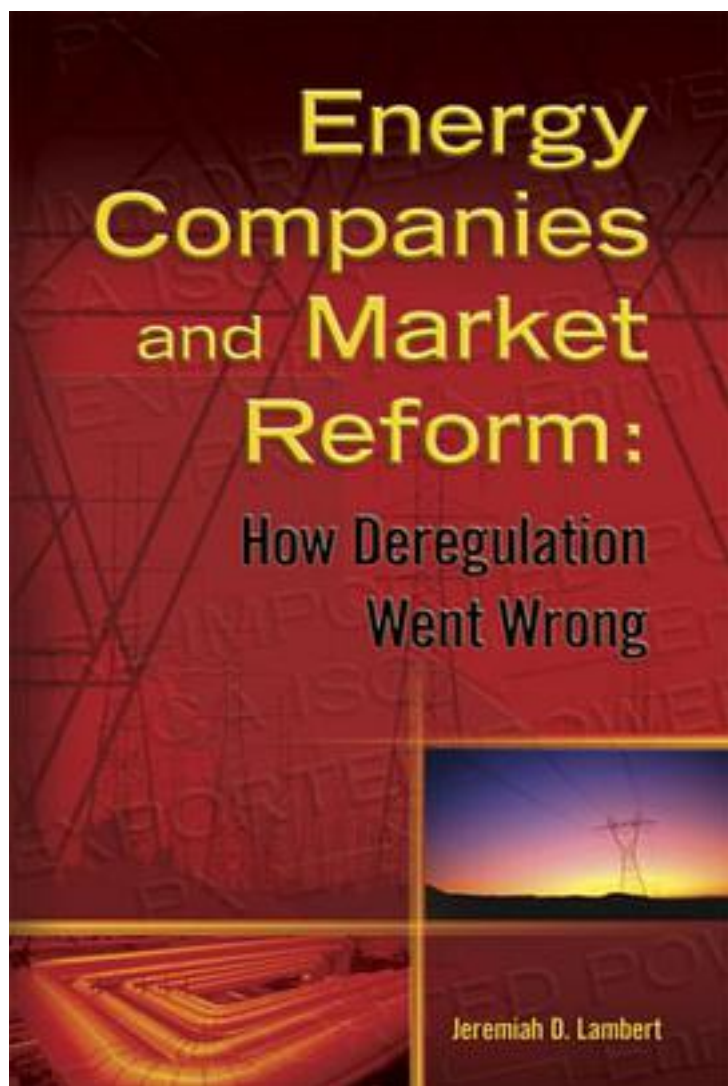


Energy Companies and Market Reform
