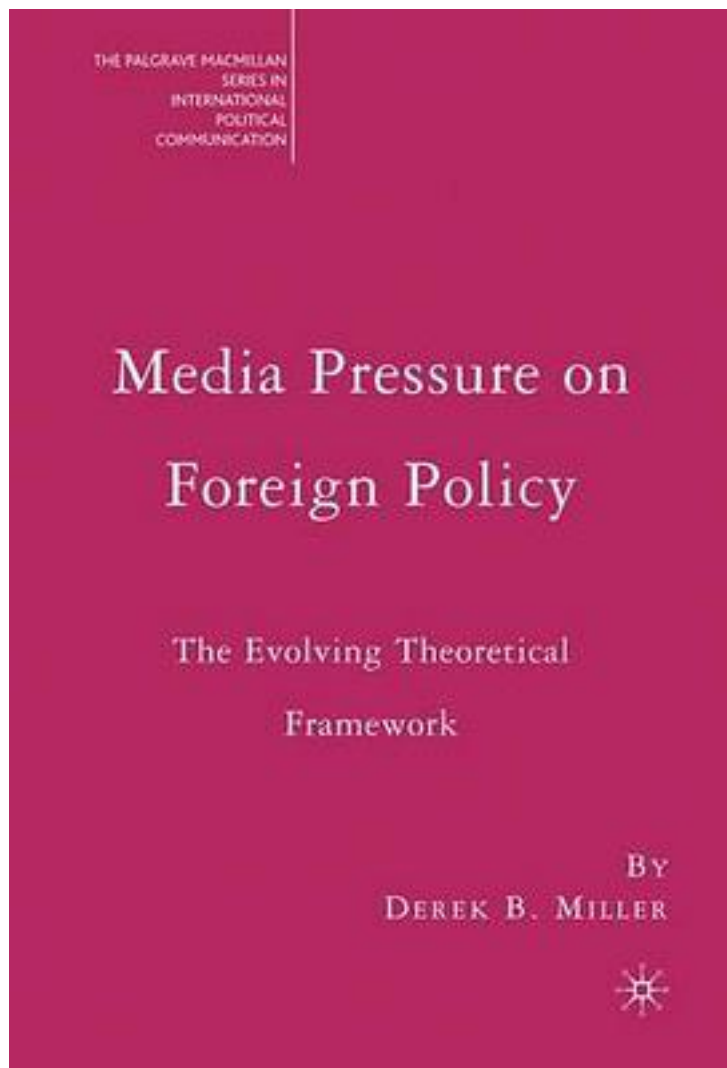


Media Pressure on Foreign Policy
