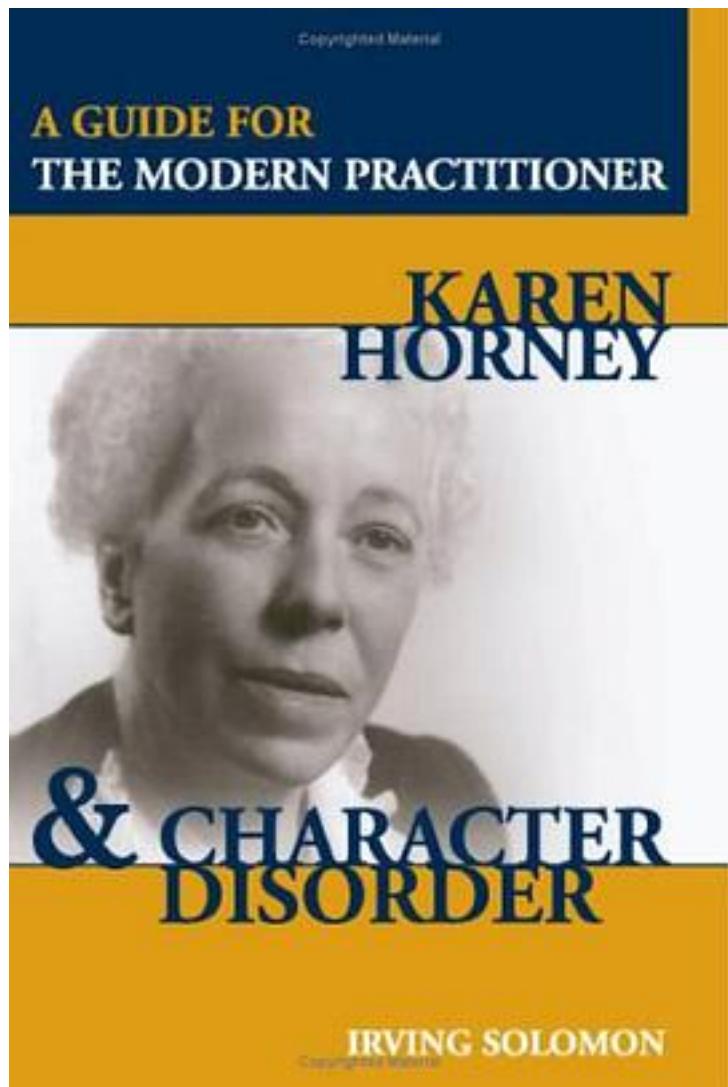


# Karen Horney and Character Disorder
