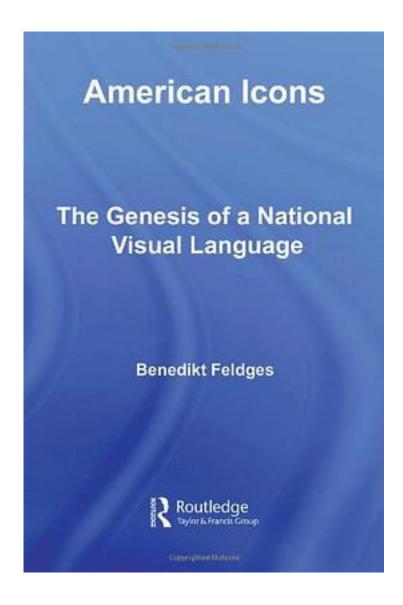
American Icons
