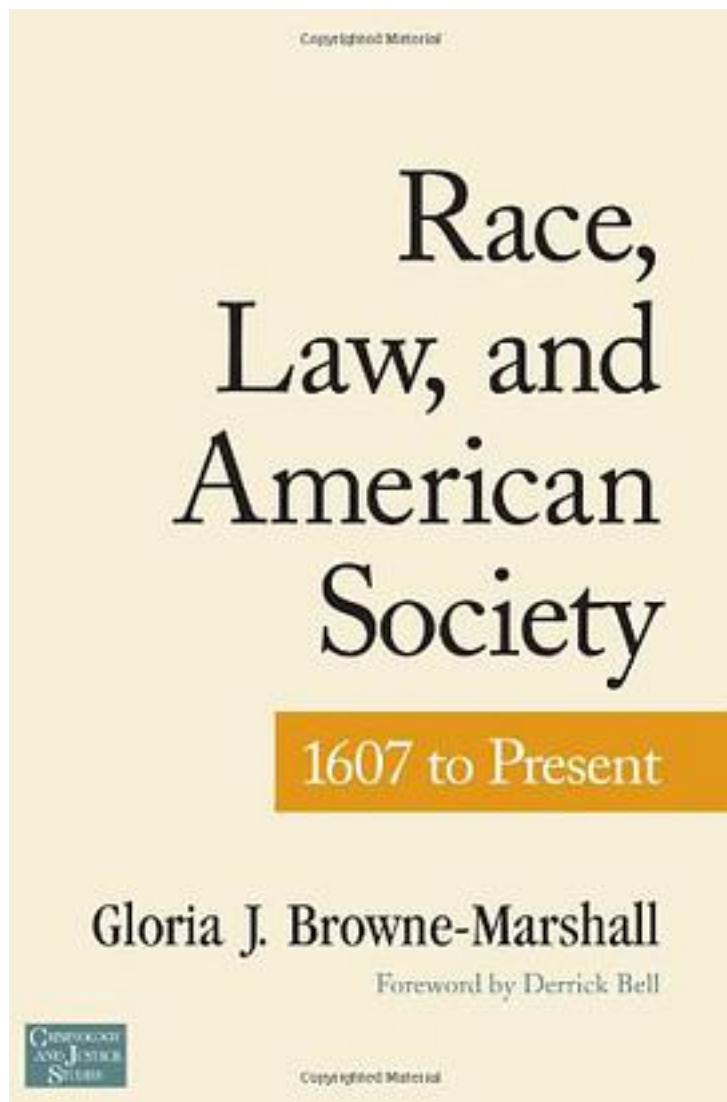


# Race, Law, and American Society
