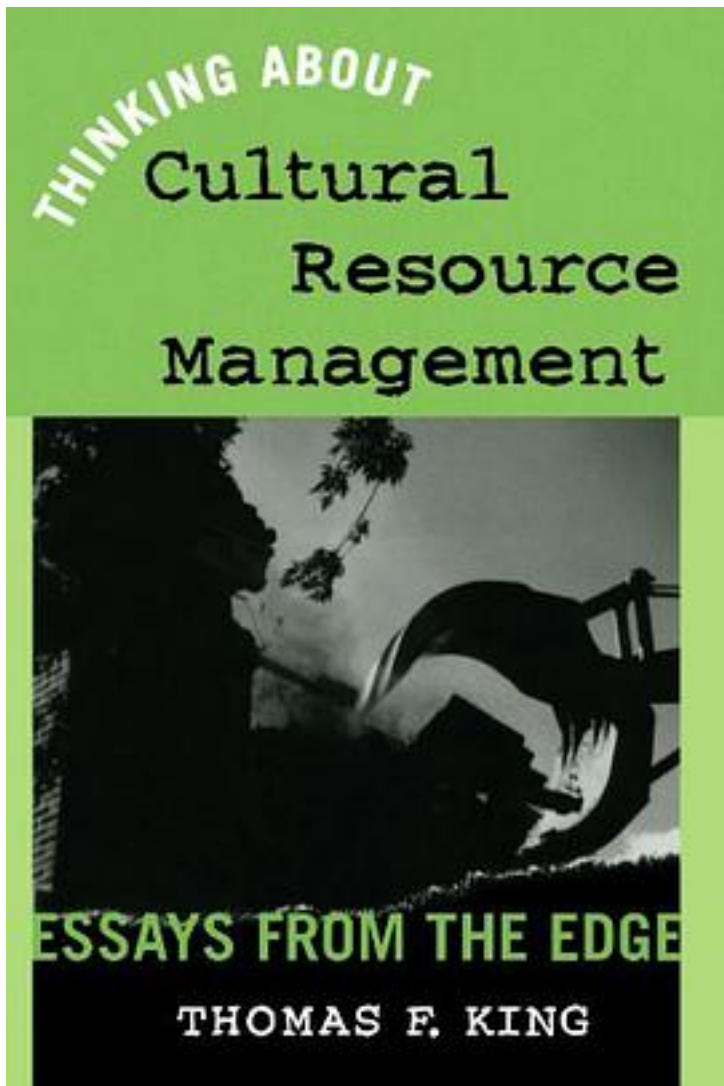


Thinking About Cultural Resource Management
