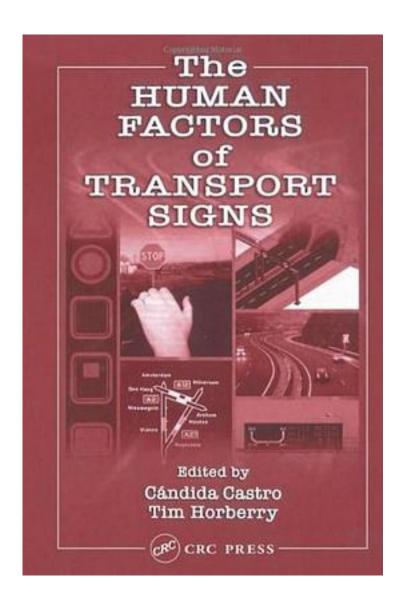
The Human Factors of Transport Signs
