

Holding on or Letting Go: Men and Career Change at Midlife



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What are the causes of the much discussed male midlife crisis? Is age the only determining factor? Why and in what ways do questions of self-image and life goals reassess themselves at midlife? How do individuals adapt or fail to adapt to the midlife passage--and to the dramatic career changes that often emerge from it? In this probing analysis of a group of lawyers, engineers, scientists, and businessmen who left established professions to pursue careers in the creative arts, Samuel Osherson goes beyond simplistic explanations of the midlife crisis. The book places the radical career changes of these men squarely in the context of their total life situations and adult developmental experiences.

Osherson found that all of the men had undergone self-revealing experiences but they differed in the degree to which they listened and responded to these experiences. Drawing on a carefully worked out model of adult development, the author explains why some people confidently confront changes in their lives while others seem to be less able to experience transition. Richly illustrated with excerpts from interviews, *Holding On or Letting Go* links the tasks and challenges of midlife with those of other points in the life cycle. Osherson's original and sophisticated analysis illuminates the crucial factors--career selection, marital choice, parental relationships, and adolescent experiences--underlying the difficult questions that are posed anew with increased urgency at midlife.

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
