begins and ends in our
 minds. Broadlyii¼Œ it applies to the land lying beyond the coastal citiesi¼Œ townsi¼Œ the settled
 rural areasi¼Œ and the green slopes of the Great Dividing Range; this means that it covers
 more than three-quarters of the continent.
 A good portion of the outback pushes into tropical regions i'4C where the climate is more < br > stable with its Weo distinct seasons i1/4 © the Wet and the Dry. Despite the lush tropical
br > vegetation around its rivers and lagoonsi'/4Œ this northern region is as inhospitablei¼Œ and as
 sparsely populatedi¼Œ as the rest of the outback. Further inlandi¼Œ the climate can be
br > unpredictable, since normal weather-patterns are frequently disrupted by drought's or < br > excessive rains.
 The outback may be harshii/4Œ but there is lit+de doubt that its 1 500 000 square kilo-
 metres contain some of the Earth s most unusual scenery. Its warmi¼Œ rich colours are a

y delight for photographers and artists. No scene is the same in the morning as in the

 sacred Dreamtime legends. For white Australians, it is the heartland of our legends and
 traditions: since its settlement, seemingly ordinary men and women have carried out
 many cxtraordinary feats, often under severe hardshipi¼Œ in a land that will never tolerate
 tl~e weak. These remarkable people and their exploits now live on in the outstanding

Smckman s Hall of Fame, in Longreach, western Queensland.
 For many visitors, there is often a heightened expectation of adventure when
