

provide one popular method: for example 14 © Cecil John Street became < br > John Rhode; Morris'West about-faced to Michael East and Owen
 Seaman thought up Nauticus. Very basic anagrams or part anagrams,
such as Melusa Moŏlson for Samuel Solomon, John Gannold for John
Langdon and Walter De La Mare s Walter Ramali¼Œ come a close second.
