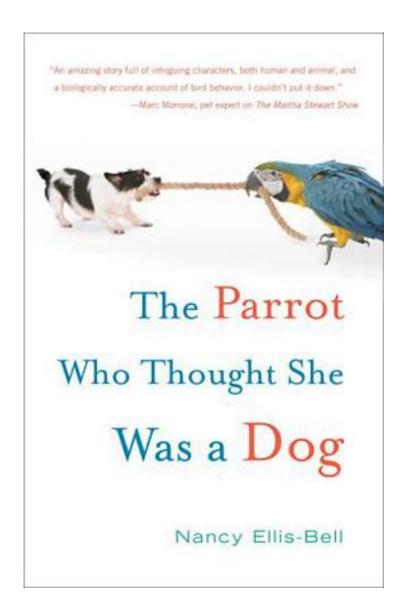
The Parrot Who Thought She Was a Dog
