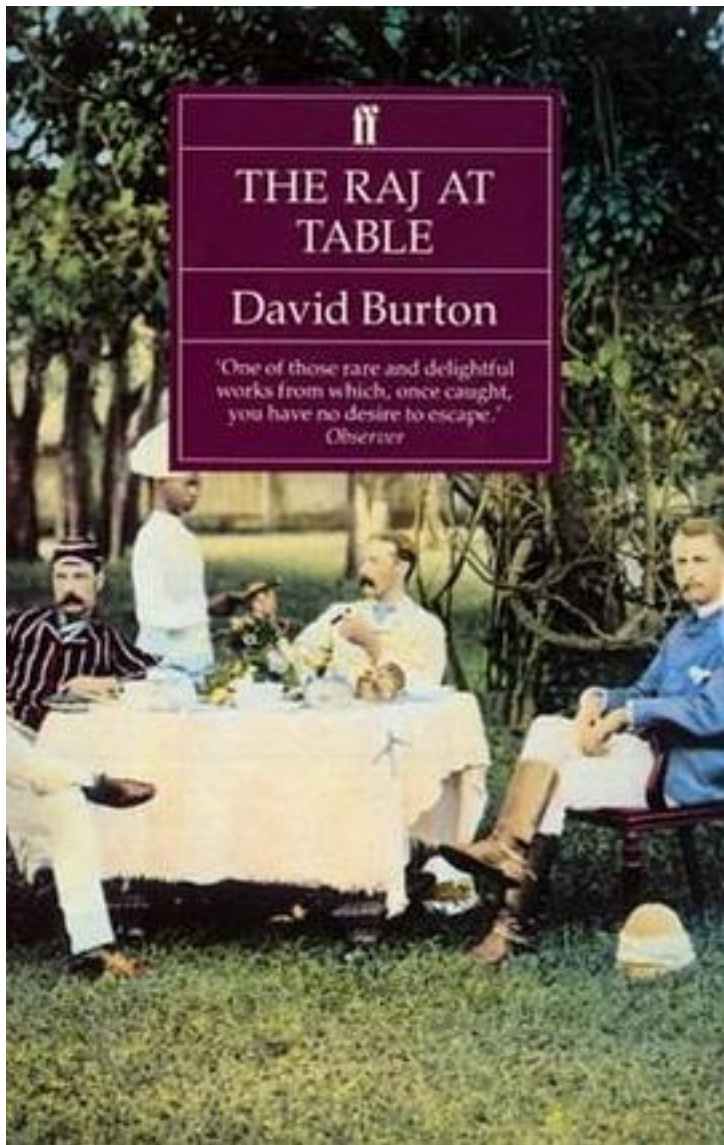


The Raj at Table: A Culinary History of the British in India



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While the British were in India they developed a curious cuisine all of their own. Anglo-Indian cooking was at its best when it achieved a kind of cultural balance; mulligatawny, kedgerree and Worcestershire sauce are all products of the Raj.
