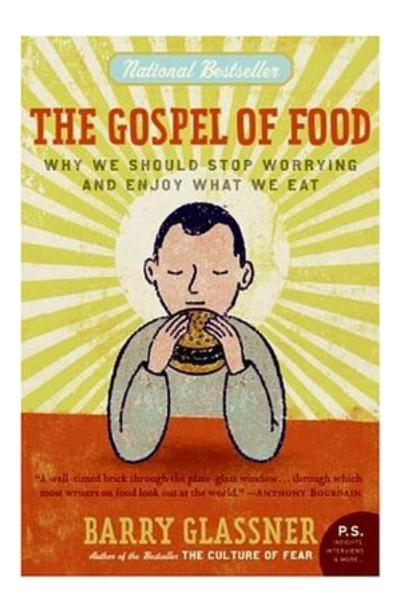
The Gospel of Food
