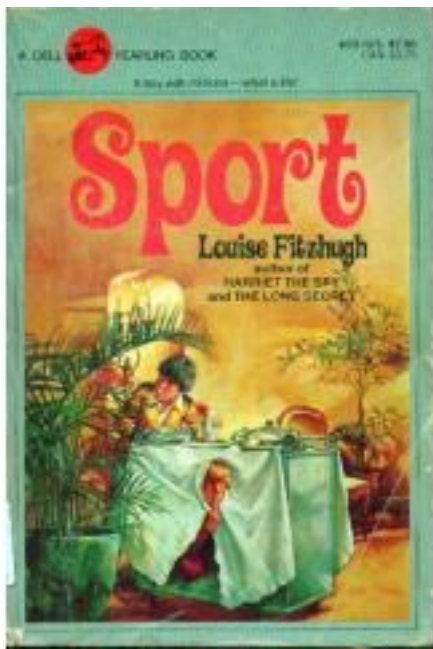


Sport
