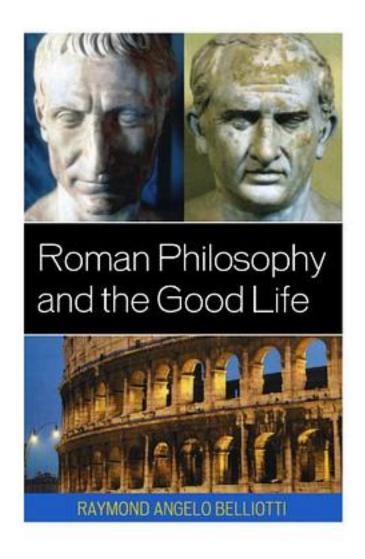
Roman Philosophy and the Good Life
