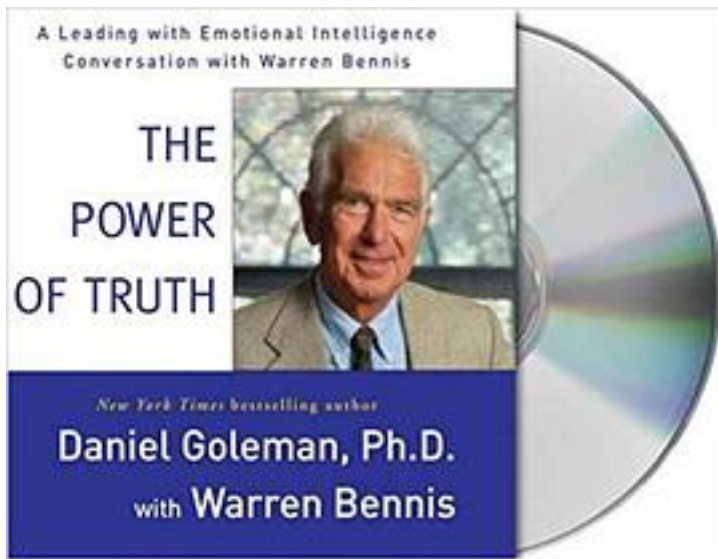


# The Power of Truth
