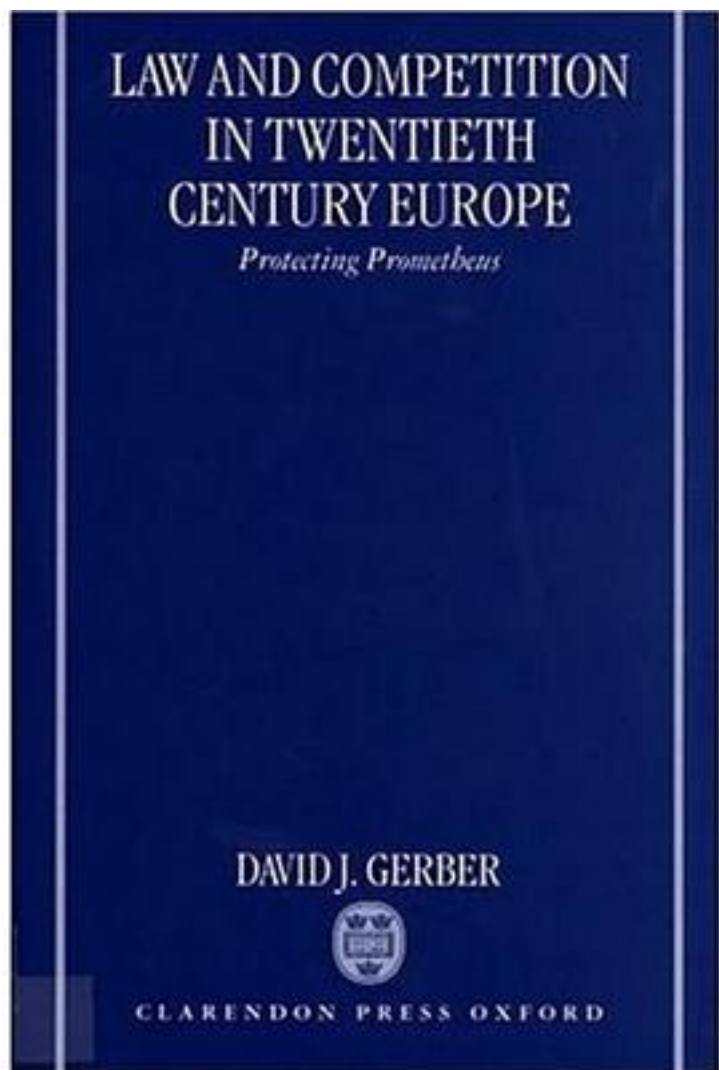


# Law and Competition in Twentieth Century Europe
